IBIZA, MEDITERRANEAN THRILLS

There are many authentic thrills and pleasures awaiting you on the most multifaceted island in Spain and the Mediterranean; a unique world-famous place that stands out for its diversity and beauty.

Ibiza is the essence of the Mediterranean. Its beaches, landscapes, heritage, cuisine and people embody the best of the cultures that over the centuries have forged the unique personality of this island like no other in the world. Entertaining, natural, cosmopolitan, extravagant, romantic and fun-loving, Ibiza is an ideal holiday destination for families and travellers of all kinds and all ages: hikers, divers, sailors, cyclists, gourmets, clubbers, artists, lovers of street markets, etc.

A host of holidays just a stone's throw away

The island of Ibiza has the good fortune of being home to a wealth of treasures and surprises in an area of just 572 km², which allows you to explore its attractions with ease and without taking up too much time between trips. The distance between the two furthest points on the island is less than 50 kilometres, although most of the tourist sites of interest can be reached in an average of 15 minutes by car or motorbike, depending on the point of origin. Ibiza also offers travellers various tourist areas in which to stay and enjoy beautiful beaches, fun leisure activities and delicious cuisine.

An island to enjoy all year round

Ibiza has a typically Mediterranean climate, with warm summers with hardly any rain and pleasant, sunny winters. With almost 3,000 hours of sunshine a year and very mild average temperatures, Ibiza can be enjoyed 365 days a year, as each season has its own attractions. Apart from the beautiful beaches with their turquoise waters, the island offers a rich historical and cultural heritage that the visitor can admire in its traditional architecture, archaeological sites and folklore, as well as an extensive network of hiking and cycling trails that are ideal for autumn, winter and spring. Furthermore, the island's landscape changes with the seasons, giving prominence to the ever-present pine forests, olive and orange groves, almond blossom, bare fig trees and the leafy shade of the carob tree depending on the time of year.

Simple pleasures by the sea

The 210 kilometres of Ibiza's coastline and its almost 60 beaches offer the simplest and most attractive summer pleasures, such as swimming in a secluded cove with turquoise waters, taking a siesta under the shade of a pine tree, snorkelling, paddle surfing or kayaking, gazing at the horizon from the top of a watchtower, wandering along a coastal path and discovering a new favourite spot, enjoying a delicious fish dish by the sea, admiring Ibiza's famous sunsets with the best chill-out music, playing with the family on beaches that are safe for children to swim in, strolling along the shore, etc.: pure Mediterranean life tinged with the magic of Ibiza.

IBIZA, WORLD HERITAGE

Ibiza boasts four places recognised as World Heritage sites by UNESCO under the name of Ibiza, Biodiversity and Culture. A legacy of extraordinary value that is well worth enjoying during your holidays.

When UNESCO added Ibiza to the World Heritage list in 1999, it highlighted the importance of preserving for future generations the ecological value of the **Posidonia Oceanica meadows** and the heritage of centuries and millennia preserved in the **Renaissance citadel and acropolis of Ibiza**, the **Phoenician site of Sa Caleta** and the **Phoenician-Punic necropolis of Puig des Molins**. These four sites can be visited on a single trip or by including them as stops on other tours around the island, combining them with a swim at the beach, a seafood lunch by the sea or a visit to a museum, for example.

The eternal citadel of Philip II

Crowned by the cathedral, the citadel of Ibiza is one of the most outstanding examples of Renaissance military architecture due to the excellent state of conservation of its walls and fortifications and the influence it exerted on the design of the fortresses built in the New World. Meanwhile, the acropolis of Ibiza, known as **Dalt Vila** - the upper town - preserves traces of passage of the Phoenicians, Moors and Catalans through the island in its walls and urban fabric. The Portal de Ses Taules, (main entrance), the bastion of Santa Llúcia, the Paseo de Ronda and the stately mansions on Calle Major are some of the stops to include on a tour of Dalt Vila, a beautiful setting that hosts dramatised visits, concerts, exhibitions, period markets and other interesting cultural activities throughout the year.





When Ibiza was Phoenician-Punic

The archaeological sites of the settlement of **Sa Caleta** and the **necropolis of Puig des Molins**, with more than 3,000 hypogaea, were recognised by UNESCO as World Heritage sites for being a unique and extraordinary source of information about the social life and urban development of the Phoenician colonies settled in the Western Mediterranean. These are two stops of great interest that no traveller with a passion for history and archaeology should miss and which are easy to add to a tour of the city or the south of the island.

An undersea treasure trove of vegetation

In 1999, the UNESCO committee highlighted the high ecological value of the immense **Posidonia Oceanica** meadow that stretches between Ibiza and Formentera as the best preserved in the Mediterranean and an excellent example of the beneficial influence that this marine plant has on marine ecosystems and the preservation of beaches. The meadow located within the Ses Salines de Ibiza and Formentera Natural Park is home to numerous plant and animal species, offering food, protection and a safe space for the spawning of young fish. This natural jewel is also responsible for the purity, cleanliness and transparency of the water in the coves and beaches of Ibiza, such as Ses Salines and Es Cavallet, both located within the Natural Park.

IBIZA, AN ISLAND FOR NATURE LOVERS

The White Island never fails to impress with the beauty of its landscapes featuring pine-covered hills, wild beaches and coves, valleys of reddish earth dotted with olive, carob, almond and fig trees, a seabed rich in life and islets embellishing the horizon of the sea.

Many travellers come to Ibiza in search of beautiful coves and beaches with crystal-clear waters and leave the island captivated by the scenery and nature of the interior. The island boasts stunningly beautiful countryside dotted with traditional white houses and its hillsides covered with lush evergreen forests of Aleppo pines. They have always played such an important role in the island's natural environment that the Greeks called the archipelago formed by Ibiza and Formentera the **Pityusic Islands**, the *pine islands*, as recorded by Pliny the Elder (22-79 AD) in his Natural History.

But in addition to this green mantle that can be seen in any panoramic view, Ibiza offers many other breathtaking sights, such as the blossoming almond tree fields of Santa Agnès de Corona, the red-soiled vineyards of Sant Mateu d'Albarca, the famous and spectacular sunsets, the carob tree fields with grazing sheep, the steep cliffs of the north, among others.

Nature open to all

More than 43% of the island's surface area is protected, 17.7% of which is made up of eight natural areas catalogued as the Natura 2000 Network, including the **Ses Salines Natural Park** of Ibiza and Formentera and the **Es Amunts de Ibiza** beauty spot. Furthermore, 75.4% of Ibiza's coastline is also protected, such as the **Marine Reserve of the northeast coast of Ibiza-Tagomago** and the **Nature Reserves of Es Vedrà, Es Vedranell and the western islets**.

Enjoying Ibiza's most stunning landscapes and beauty spots is easy and highly stimulating thanks to the extensive network of hiking and cycling trails that covers the island and the various kayaking and paddle surfing routes that can be followed along the coastline of the island. And for the more curious travellers, there are some interesting educational facilities, such as the Cap Blanc Aquarium, the Puig des Molins astronomical observatory and the Ses Salines, Es Amunts and Can Planetes interpretation centres.





Names to be remembered

Among the flora and fauna on Ibiza there are names worth remembering, such as the Pityusic **lizard**, a species endemic to Ibiza and Formentera that is easy to spot along walls and paths; the common **flamingo**, which lives for most of the year in the ponds of the Ses Salines Natural Park; the **Ibizan hound**, a local breed that stands out for its reddish patches; the Eleonora's falcon, the Balearic shearwater, the **Posidonia meadows** that filter and oxygenate the waters of the beaches and coves, and the ancient olive trees, among others. A natural treasure that makes any stay on Ibiza even more unforgettable.

IBIZA, MEMORIES OF AN ISLAND

Being an island, Ibiza has nurtured and protected a rich heritage of traditions that is very appealing to sensitive and curious travellers; because there is no better way to soak up the essence of the island than to join in its fiestas and admire the richness of its architecture and popular craftsmanship.

The countryside of Ibiza treasures beauty in its simplicity and centuries of tradition in its houses, churches, dry stone walls, wells and fountains; a legacy passed down from generation to generation that enabled families to be self-sufficient, to make the most of the resources of their surroundings and to adapt to the environment. The absence of the superfluous, far from detracting from the beauty of Ibiza's architecture, did quite the opposite, as the simplicity of its lines and the adaptation to the needs of each family created a unique style that is admired by architects and artists alike.

All over the island you can find excellent examples of traditional farmhouses, with their whitewashed walls, their cubic shapes and their small windows. To discover the architecture that earned Ibiza the nickname of the *White Island*, all you have to do is take a drive inland along the secondary roads, where the whitewashed houses can be seen in the middle of a farm field or converted into cosy restaurants. And to get to know the typical

features of traditional dwellings, such as the *porxo* or porch, the *trull* or oil mill and the use of *posidonia* as insulation, a visit to the **Ethnographic Museum of Ibiza** is a must.

A dance of its own

The *ball pagès*, the traditional dance of Ibiza, stands out as a folk performance unlike any other in the Mediterranean. Centuries old and of uncertain origin, this ancestral courtship dance is celebrated in all the island's popular festivals and in the weekly performances scheduled during the summer season.

It is worth going to these events to admire the various dances, in which the woman or women move slowly round in curves while the man constantly jumps around her or them while playing large castanets called **castanyoles**. In addition to the dance, attention should be paid to the traditional costumes, the gold work of the **emprendades**, true works of art in gold, silver and coral that adorn the women's chests, and the instrumental group that accompanies the dancers, made up of the drum, the flute and the *espasí*, a unique metal percussion instrument that resembles a sword.



TRADITIONAL CARTS

Festival days

It is very easy to find out how the Ibizan people celebrate their traditions: all you have to do is go to the patron saint festivals in the villages or to the more than twenty *ballades populars* (traditional dances) that are held around wells and fountains from April to October. On all these occasions, the *ball pagès* performance is followed by a tasting of traditional sweets (*orelletes* and *bunyols*). Apart from these festive events, visitors can also enjoy the beauty and peculiarity of the *ball pagès* in the performances scheduled during the summer season in the courtyard of the church of Sant Miquel and in the port of Ibiza.

IBIZA, AN ISLAND FULL OF FLAVOUR

Holiday destinations that leave a good taste in the mouth are unforgettable. And our island is full of culinary pleasures thanks to its traditional and very tasty recipes, fresh fish and seafood, top-quality local produce and an immense passion for good food, which is reflected in an excellent range of restaurants. An island good enough to eat. And have seconds.

The island's fertile soil and the richness of its seabed supply the pantries of the houses and restaurants of Ibiza with top-quality raw materials. Because of this, the cuisine has become one of the great attractions of our island, and travellers can savour both typical island dishes and the new contemporary Ibizan cuisine, as well as culinary offerings from the most diverse corners of the world. Enjoy a seafood paella on the beach, savour the products of the Ibizan sea with a grilled fish or a **bullit de peix** (fish stew), share a tasty **sofrit pagès** (meat and potato dish), try the island's sheep and goat cheeses or its tasty **sobrasada** (cured pork sausage), end the meal with a portion of **flaó** (cheesecake) and a glass of Ibizan herb liqueur, explore the tempting proposals of haute cuisine, drink a toast with a glass of Ibizan wine. It will take you many trips to sample the full menu of delicacies that our island has to offer!

An age-old culinary heritage

Ibizan cuisine is the result of the sum of the culinary knowledge and traditions of the peoples who have inhabited the island over the centuries. Phoenicians, Romans, Moors and Catalans left their mark on a seafood and rural recipe book where there is no shortage of preservation techniques such as marinating, pickling and curing. Ibiza offers travellers an age-old culinary tour through its tastiest traditional dishes. Seafood products are used to prepare, for example, fried octopus, **bullit de peix** (a fish stew boiled with potatoes and accompanied by seafood rice), **calamares a la bruta** or squid stuffed with **sobrasada**, **borrida de rajada** (skate stew), **gerret** (picarel) in pickled sauce or in rice with cauliflower, fried **raor** (pearly razorfish) and many other dishes featuring the Ibiza red lobster, grouper, John Dory, red scorpion fish, **espardenyes** (sea cucumber), Ibizan prawn, monk-

fish, *servia* (greater amberjack), and dentex, among others.

Meanwhile, the land provides the key ingredients for dishes of a rustic nature, such as *arroz de matances* (rice and meat dish), tomato salad with dried fish and *crostres* (croutons), *frita de porc* (fried pork dish), *faves ofegades* (literally, drowned broad beans), *sofrit pagès* (meat and potato dish), *cuinat* (a type of vigil potage), *coca de pimentos* (pepper cake), etc. And then there are the desserts, which include *flaó* (a cake made with sheep's or goat's cheese and mint), *greixonera* (a type of *ensaimada* pudding), *bunyols* or fritters and *orelletes*, a spongy dessert with the aroma of lemon and aniseed in the shape of an ear.

Good food and wine

Red potatoes and watermelons are two of the highlights of Ibiza's fertile countryside, whose market gardens supply markets and restaurants with a wide variety of fruits and vegetables, as well as a growing number of organic products: tomatoes, broad beans, peas, cabbages, aubergines, figs, citrus fruits, melons, avocados, peppers, medlars, asparagus, strawberries, artichokes, pumpkins, etc. Not to mention sea salt, the native breeds of livestock (Ibizan sheep, Pityusic goat and black pig) and the three products with Protected Geographical Indication (PGI): *Hierbas Ibicencas* (Ibizan herb liqueur); *Ibiza, Vino de la Tierra | Vi de la Terra* (Wine of the Land) and *Aceite de Oliva de Ibiza | Oli d'Oliva d'Eivissa* (Ibizan olive oil).

IBIZA, SHOPPING WITH CHARACTER

It is difficult to leave Ibiza empty-handed. Its hippy markets and boutiques abound in creations with their own distinctive character, both in fashion and accessories as well as in crafts and food products. There is something to suit all tastes and suitcases.

Cosmopolitan, relaxed, outward-looking and very inspiring, the unique character of our island has influenced its creations in art, design and crafts since the first European and North American travellers, many of them intellectuals, architects and bohemians, began to arrive in the 1930s. That stream of creativity was boosted when Ibiza became one of the international havens of the hippy movement, which brought the island its thirst for freedom, its lack of rules and its characteristic style, which still inspires designers and goldsmiths, and which sowed the seed of one of Ibiza's iconic brands: Adlib fashion.

Adlib Fashion: the style of Ibiza

It was in 1971 when Yugoslavian princess Smilja Mihailovitch launched the so-called Adlib Fashion, a free, casual style inspired by the traditional garments of Ibizan women and the hippy aesthetics of the time. Its name came from the Latin term *ad-libitum*, which means "at pleasure", and its motto was: "**Dress as you like, but dress with taste**". Several decades later, Adlib Fashion has become one of the island's creative benchmarks, a product recognised at international fashion shows that stands out for its comfortable and bright designs, the use of 100% natural fabrics and the inclusion of crochet trimmings, ruffles, embroidery and traditional lace. Currently, there is a wide range of prestigious Adlib Fashion designers on the island and a large group of new creators whose garments and accessories can be bought in numerous boutiques on Ibiza.

From hippy market to hippy market

One of the most popular tourist attractions on our island are the **hippy markets**, a must for lovers of shopping and unique finds. During the summer months, it is easy to find an original item or a nice souvenir as there is a hippy market every day of the week. The most famous are the Las Dalias Hippy Market, which is open every Saturday of the year, and the Punta Arabi Hippy Market, which is held every Wednesday from May to October and is the oldest and largest on the island. In addition to these two unmissable markets, the island has a number of other markets with their own personality, such as those of Sant Rafel, Santa Gertrudis, Sant Miquel, Sant Antoni, the Sant Jordi second-hand market and the Sant Joan craft market.



HIPPIY MARKET

Pottery, art and delicatessen

However, there are even more made-in-Ibiza treats to fall in love with. For example, the pottery items that the masters produce in the workshop-shops of Sant Rafel, a village declared an "Area of Craft Interest"; the paintings and sculptures by local artists on display in Ibiza's art galleries; and a delicious variety of culinary souvenirs with which to remember the flavour of Ibiza once you are at home: Ibiza honey, Ibiza salt, Ibizan herb liqueur, sheep's or goat's cheese, *sobrasada*, olive oil, Ibiza wines and pastries, such as *orelletes*, *flaó* and *ensaimada*.

IBIZA, CULTURE IN THE SUN

Places that are meeting points have many stories to tell. Ibiza is no exception, as evidenced by its museums, interpretation centres, archaeological sites, art galleries and important landmarks. Not to mention the musical culture that in recent decades has made our island an international benchmark.

Ibiza has a rich heritage that is well worth discovering during your holidays on the island, whether in the summer or on a getaway in the low season. There can be no excuse for not visiting the points of interest given how little time it takes to reach them. Any time will do to include a cultural visit in the day's agenda: before going to the beach, during a stroll through Dalt Vila, while exploring the south of the island, at sunset, etc. Most of the museums and cultural facilities on the island have free admission, and their educational content will be of interest to travellers of all ages. A journey across the centuries starting with the Punic and ending in the present day with all the freshness of contemporary creations in art and music.

Once upon a time...

Throughout its history, the various civilisations and cultures that inhabited Ibiza left behind an outstanding historical and artistic heritage that can be admired today in the island's different museums and interpretation centres. The Phoenician-Punic legacy, for example, can be seen in the Puig des Molins Museum-Necropolis, the settlement of Sa Caleta, the rural settlement of Ses Païsses de Cala d'Hort, the Sa Capelleta Interpretation Centre and the Punic sanctuary of Es Culleram. The Moorish era can be seen in the fascinating Madina Yabisa Interpretation Centre, while the neighbouring Cathedral of Ibiza houses the Diocesan Museum and its artistic pieces that arrived on the island after the Catalan conquest. Other stops on this journey through time include the museumised bastions of Sant Pere and Sant Jaume; the church of Mare de Déu, in the town of Jesús, whose 15th-century altarpiece is the jewel of the

island's religious artistic heritage; and the Sa Sal Rossa tower, one of the seven watchtowers that remain standing and which were erected along the Ibizan coastline from the 16th century onwards to defend against enemy attacks.


From tradition to the avant-garde

In the 20th century, Ibiza opened up to the world and revealed the uniqueness of its traditions and customs. You can discover this heritage and find out how the islanders lived before the arrival of tourism thanks to the pictorial collection of the Puget Museum and the comprehensive exhibition of utensils, costumes, domestic objects, jewellery and tools on display in the Ibiza Eth-

nographic Museum, located in an old farmhouse that itself is an excellent example of a traditional dwelling. And to get to know contemporary Ibiza, the Ibiza that inspires national and international artists, just include in your agenda the Ibiza Museum of Contemporary Art - MACE, open since 1969 and one of the oldest avant-garde museums in Spain, the Casa Broner or any of the art galleries open all over the island, which are yet another reflection of Ibiza's creative spirit.

Whether you be submerged in the sea or with your feet planted firmly on the ground, Ibiza offers plenty of fun for the most active travellers and sports enthusiasts: a full range of active tourism activities and sporting competitions for you to enjoy the island's nature all year round, while exercising your body and overcoming new challenges.

Walk through a silent valley hidden from the hustle and bustle, circumnavigate the coast by boat, search for fish under the surface of the sea, admire the rural landscape on horseback, cycle to the top of Sa Talaia, the highest mountain on Ibiza, discover the most beautiful spots along the coastline on board a kayak or stand-up paddleboard, play golf, ride a jet ski, explore caves, shipwrecks and other deep-sea treasures, go windsurfing or kitesurfing, etc.

The variety of sporting activities available in Ibiza is very diverse and attractive, with no shortage of challenges and entertainment for all ages and all levels of experience. In fact, the island's annual calendar of **sporting events** includes national and international competitions in cycling, marathons, triathlons, sailing, trial biking, mountain biking, open water swimming, rallies, athletics races, etc. All the

more reason to look at the calendar and plan a getaway to Ibiza!

Fun beyond the towel

With 210 kilometres of coastline and a very mild climate, the island has no shortage of places or opportunities to get away from the sun lounger and give your body a good dose of sea action. In the various tourist resorts and at numerous beaches and coves, travellers will find a wide range of companies specialising in water and nautical activities: water skiing, kitesurfing, paddle surfing, kayaking, snorkelling, rides on pedalos, inflatables or jet skis, fishing, parasailing, etc. Not to mention the schools that offer sailing and scuba diving courses. A whole host of good reasons to get off your towel and head out to sea!

Outdoor action 365 days a year

The best way to admire the authentic Ibiza that survives in the fields, valleys and forests is to do it at a leisurely pace on foot or by bicycle. The island has an extensive network of mountain biking and hiking routes that are well marked and signposted, making it very easy to make this activity part of your holiday. Information on the different routes and their levels of difficulty - low, intermediate and high - can be obtained from the tourist information websites of the municipalities, as well as the programme of free guided tours organised by the local councils throughout the year.

Cycle touring, golf and horse riding are other sports that can be practised in Ibiza all year round thanks to the mild temperatures that prevail on average in the different seasons and the range of specialised companies that provide equipment for outdoor sports.

IBIZA, HISTORY AND HEDONISM

Extroverted, hedonistic and very Mediterranean. This is the island's capital, a lively city by day and at night with centuries of history behind it and plenty to see: the citadel, the historic quarters outside the walls, the port, the necropolis, the museums, etc. Not to mention the shops, cafés, restaurants, pubs and clubs where you can enjoy today's Ibiza.

The distinctive outline of Ibiza's acropolis welcomes travellers arriving on the island via the port of Botafoc, where the large cruise ships and shipping companies from the mainland and Majorca dock. Being a port, the city has traditionally been an excellent base from which to explore the island thanks to its varied range of accommodation of all categories, its numerous restaurants, bars and shops and its excellent public transport links to the main places of interest in the rest of the island's municipalities. With three beaches where you can have fun by the sea, the municipality stands out above all for its lively nightlife and its historical heritage, two of whose main features are the citadel (Dalt Vila) and the Necropolis of Puig des Molins, both declared World Heritage Sites by UNESCO under the denomination of Ibiza, Biodiversity and Culture. Furthermore, due to its beauty and lively nature, the island's capital has become a unique host for cultural and sporting events.

WHAT TO SEE IN IBIZA



DALT VILA: Any month is a good time to visit Ibiza's walled quarter, although it is during the summer evenings and nights when it is at its liveliest thanks to the charming restaurants surrounding the squares of Vila, Sa Carrossa and Del Sol. A stroll to the cathedral and the castle reveals interesting sights, medieval mansions, secluded little squares, art galleries and charming nooks and crannies in the purest Mediterranean style.



THE WALLS AND BASTIONS: Declared a World Heritage Site in 1999, Ibiza's Renaissance citadel is the best preserved in the Mediterranean. It was built during the second half of the 16th century according to the plan promoted by King Carlos I and King Felipe II to modernise the military infrastructures of the strategic coastal territories of the Spanish Crown with the aim of improving defence against attacks by the Ottoman Empire and other enemies of the time. The complex, which was originally only accessible through two entrances, the Portal de Ses Taules and the Portal Nou, is made up of seven bas-


tions, of which the two on the western side, Sant Jaume and Sant Pere, have been museized. From the rest of the bastions you can admire superb panoramic views of the city, the beaches of Ses Figueretes, Platja d'en Bossa and Es Cavallet and the neighbouring island of Formentera.



NECROPOLIS OF PUIG DES MOLINS: When the Phoenicians founded Ibiza in the 7th century, they chose this hill to bury their dead. Its more than 3,000 hypogea make this site located on the Puig des Molins hill the best-preserved and most extensive Phoenician-Punic necropolis in the Western Mediterranean, which has earned it recognition as a World Heritage Site. The visit to the Monographic Museum of Puig des Molins shows what burials were like in both societies and includes access to the hypogea of La Mula.



IBIZA MUSEUM OF CONTEMPORARY ART (MACE): Inaugurated in 1969, this is one of the oldest contemporary art galleries in Spain. It is located in Dalt Vila, a stone's throw from the Portal de Ses Taules entrance, and its permanent collection includes the work of the Ibizan artist Mari Ribas "Portmany", Japanese prints from the IBIZA-GRÁFIC Biennial, the outstanding collection of handmade posters donated by the gallery owner Carl van der Voort and works by renowned contemporary artists such as Micus, Adolfo Schlosser, Raoul Hausmann, Tàpies and Luis Gordillo.



PUGET MUSEUM: Can Comasema, a Gothic manor house located in Dalt Vila, houses this collection of watercolours and oil paintings by Narcís Puget Viñas and Narcís Puget Riquer, two painters, father and son, who portrayed traditional Ibiza in the first half of the 20th century.



CATHEDRAL AND DIOCESAN MUSEUM: The aesthetic taste and needs of each era led to the

successive alterations made to the original church of Santa Maria de las Nieves, erected in 1235 after the Catalan conquest. Its most significant external feature is the Gothic tower, which has a trapezoidal floor plan and a serrated pyramidal structure at the top. Inside the church you can visit the Diocesan Museum, with a collection of artworks dating from the 13th to 20th centuries.



MADINA YABISA AND SA CAPELLETA INTERPRETATION CENTRES: These two educational facilities reveal the remains that still survive from the Phoenician, Punic, Roman and Moorish periods of Ibiza.



THE HISTORIC NEIGHBOURHOODS OUTSIDE THE WALLS: La Marina and Sa Penya maintain the maritime nature typical of Mediterranean cities, with simple houses with white façades and a distinctly seafaring air. Located next to the harbour, the streets of these neighbourhoods are full of life during the summer season thanks to their boutiques, shops, bars, restaurants, ice cream parlours and cafés, many of them with views of the marina and the luxurious boats that dock there. The Plaza del Parque square and the Vara de Rey promenade, with its remarkable colonial-style buildings, are other sites not to be missed on a stroll through the centre of Ibiza.

WHAT TO DO IN IBIZA


- Go shopping in La Marina, Dalt Vila and the Eixample, where Adlib Fashion boutiques, street stalls, traditional shops, national and international brands, art galleries and multi-brand shops abound.
- Take the water taxi that links the La Marina neighbourhood with the seafront promenade and Talamanca beach.

- See how the craftspeople produce their wares at the Sa Pedrera craft market, which is open to the public on Fridays.
- Enjoy the city's lively nightlife, especially in Dalt Vila, La Marina, the port, the promenade and Ses Figueretes.
- Walk along the city walls from bastion to bastion, paying attention to their information panels and museum facilities.
- Join the dramatised guided tours organised by Ibiza Town Hall.
- Buy pastries in the cloistered convent of Sant Cristòfol, popularly known as *Ses Monges Tancades* (the closed nuns) and other Ibizan food products in the Mercat Nou and Mercat Vell markets.

THE BEACHES OF IBIZA

The capital also has beaches where you can bathe and enjoy water sports, and all of them are easily accessible. To the north of the municipality, in the bay of **Talamanca**, lies the 900-metre-long beach of the same name, with leisure, accommodation and restaurant services. Closer to the historic centre is the beach of **Ses Figueretes**, behind which lies the neighbourhood of the same name and a multitude of hotels, restaurants, shops, cafés, bars and pubs. And following Ses Figueretes is **Platja d'en Bossa**, a long stretch of sand shared by the municipalities of Ibiza and Sant Josep, which has one of the widest ranges of leisure and accommodation on the island.

SANTA EULÀRIA, THE HIPPIEST AND MOST FAMILY-FRIENDLY IBIZA

There are many attractions that make this municipality a must-see destination in Ibiza, such as the island's most famous hippy markets, the emblematic Puig de Missa, the inland villages and the numerous high-quality beaches with services that have for decades attracted families and tourists in search of a relaxing holiday by the sea.

The cosmopolitan atmosphere of the eastern side of Ibiza stems from the genuine hospitality of its people and the creative influence left behind by the hippies who found refuge in its peaceful countryside. The municipality's historic restaurants with walls adorned with paintings signed by the artists of the time are testimony to a hippy heritage that can also be seen in art galleries, workshop-shops and the popular hippy markets of Las Dalias and Punta Arabí, the latter of which has been open since 1975. This relaxed and respectful spirit also extends to the tourist areas of Cala Llonga, Es Canar, S'Argamassa and Es Figueral, with a long tradition as family destinations. And for culture lovers, Santa Eulària boasts some of the island's most valuable heritage assets.

WHAT TO SEE IN SANTA EULÀRIA



SANTA EULÀRIA DES RIU: This municipality offers visitors a lively atmosphere all year round thanks to the numerous restaurants, cafés and shops concentrated around the S'Alamera boulevard, the promenade, the marina and the streets of Sant Jaume and Sant Vicent.



PUIG DE MISSA DE SANTA EULÀRIA: On top of a hill overlooking the coast stands one of the most outstanding examples of a fortress-church on Ibiza. Built in the 16th century to provide religious service and protection against Berber pirate attacks, over the next two centuries it tempered its defensive appearance with the addition of two Baroque chapels, the vestry, the vicarage and the parish house. It is well worth taking a stroll around its charming cemetery and the narrow streets that wind their way up the hill, whose houses make up the first town centre of Santa Eulària.



IBIZA ETHNOGRAPHIC MUSEUM: A visit to this old farmhouse, called Can Ros and located in Puig de Missa, is essential to learn about the island's rural architecture and the customs of traditional Ibizan society. The porxo or main hall, the oil mill, the wine cellar, the well, the kitchen and the bedrooms are some of the rooms that can be visited while observing the collection of country utensils, musical instruments, weapons, clothing, jewellery and personal items.



RIVER INTERPRETATION CENTRE | CAN PLANETES: The flour mills powered by Ibiza's only river were vital to the growth of Santa Eulària. At this interpretation centre you can see how an Andalusian water mill that was active until 1950 worked. The River Trail starts from the centre; a pleasant path with information panels that follows the course of the river to its mouth.



SANTA GERTRUDIS AND ITS TERRACES: The cosmopolitan atmosphere of the boutiques, restaurants and cafés in its pedestrianised centre have made it one of the most attractive towns on Ibiza, an ideal stop for any time of day. The lively atmosphere is centred around the church square, where the most prominent feature is the ochre yellow bell tower of the late 18th-century church.



PUNTA ARABÍ AND LAS DALIAS HIPPI MARKETS: The municipality of Santa Eulària is home to the two most popular markets on Ibiza, located in Es Canar and Sant Carles respectively. In both you can buy handicrafts, fashion, accessories, instruments, costume jewellery, decorative items and other curiosities.

SANT CARLES AND THE HIPPIES: Quiet and welcoming, this small village was a meeting point for hippies, artists and intellectuals, who from the 1960s onwards were attracted by the authenticity and beauty of its natural surroundings. It is worth visiting its church, with a double-tiered porch, relaxing on one of the terraces overlooking the church and walking to the Peralta fountain and the old farmhouse of Es Trull de Ca n'Andreu.



JESÚS AND PUIG D'EN VALLS: It is worth taking a detour to these two towns near the city of Ibiza to see the Puig d'en Valls windmill, the only one on the island whose machinery is still complete; and the church of Jesús, where you can admire the Gothic altarpiece of the Mare de Déu, whose 25 panels were masterfully crafted in the Valencian workshop of Rodrigo and Francisco de Osona.

WHAT TO DO IN SANTA EULÀRIA

- Go kayaking to the islet of Tagomago or explore the stretches between Pou des Lleó and Canal d'en Martí and between Cala Llonga and Santa Eulària, both coastal walks of great scenic beauty.
- Enjoy the rural scenery of Santa Gertrudis on horseback.
- Follow the circular hiking trails in the municipality, such as the one leading to Torre d'en Valls.
- Go surfing at Cala Martina and Cala Pada, learn to dinghy sail at Santa Eulària beach and go diving at Cala Llenya, Cala Mestella or Pou des Lleó.
- Buy an Ibizan-style souvenir in the hippy markets of Las Dalias and Punta Arabí and visit the Santa Gertrudis craft market.

- Visit Sant Carles, Cala Nova and Las Dalias hippy market on board a sightseeing train.

- Enjoy a pleasant trip along the east coast on the ferry that links the port of Ibiza with the tourist resorts of Es Canar, Santa Eulària and Cala Llonga.

- Set foot on eleven beaches in a single day by following the Ruta de las Playas (Beach Trail), a circular mountain bike trail that passes through Cala Nova, Cala Llenya, Cala Mestella, Cala Boix, Es Figueral and S'Aigua Blanca, among other beaches.

THE BEACHES OF SANTA EULÀRIA

Sandy beaches, rugged cliffs, headlands and capes jutting out from the coast, wild coves and a wealth of islets make up the beautiful coastal landscape of Santa Eulària. Along 46 kilometres of coastline, there are many beaches with calm waters ideal for children's bathing and with a wide range of services, such as **Cala Llonga, Cala Pada, Cala Martina, Es Niu Blau, S'Argamassa, Es Canar, Platja des Riu** de Santa Eulària and the **urban beach of Santa Eulària** itself, the first in the Balearic Islands to be declared a "smoke-free beach".

The best-known beaches for their photogenic beauty are **S'Aigua Blanca** and **Es Figueral** - both with views of the islet of Tagomago -, **Cala Nova, Cala Llenya** and **Cala Boix** - the only one on the island of Ibiza with dark-coloured sand -, while the most secluded coves are **Cala Mestella, Pou des Lleó, S'Estanyol** and **Cala Olivera**.

SANT JOSEP, 80 KM OF CRYSTAL-CLEAR WATERS

With its 80 kilometres of coastline, Sant Josep can boast that it is the Ibizan municipality with the most beaches and coves, including some of the most famous on the island; a great attraction to which to add areas of outstanding natural beauty, charming villages and one of the undisputed icons of the island: the islet of Es Vedrà.

The largest municipality on Ibiza attracts travellers of all kinds thanks to its wide range of leisure activities. The gateway to the island from the air - the airport is located in its municipal district -, Sant Josep has no shortage of attractions for both day and night, making it very unlikely for you to leave Ibiza without having visited the region. Especially considering that four of the most photographed beaches on the island are to be found here: Cala d'Hort, Ses Salines, Platges de Comte and Cala Bassa. Apart from the seaside fun, there is much more to experience and discover in Sant Josep, from the centuries of history preserved in its archaeological sites to the endless supply of entertainment that awaits you every summer in the bars and clubs of the tourist centre of Platja d'en Bossa. And above all, two of the island's most valuable treasures: the Ses Salines Natural Park of Ibiza and Formentera and the Nature Reserves of Es Vedrà, Es Vedranell and the western islets.

WHAT TO SEE IN SANT JOSEP



THE TOWN OF SANT JOSEP: Quiet and surrounded by fields of crops, this small town has grown up around its church and the road. The church was built in 1730 in the characteristic style of popular Ibizan architecture and is the only church on the island with a sundial on the façade. It is worth stopping for a coffee in the pretty little square in front of the church, browsing in its shops and galleries and sampling the diverse cuisine on offer in its various restaurants. In addition, film and theatre lovers will find a varied programme at the Can Jeroni Cultural Centre.



SANT AGUSTÍ AND ITS CHURCH: This charming little hilltop town is an oasis of peace and one of the best-preserved places on the island. Its simple 18th-century church has buttresses and, like the church of Sant Francesc, stands out for its lack of a portico. It is surrounded by pleasant restaurants serving Ibizan cuisine.



ES CUBELLS: Consisting only of the church and a few houses, this village follows the Ibizan model of urban dispersion. It is well worth a visit to see its simple church, the only one on the island overlooking the sea apart from Ibiza Cathedral, admire the beauty of the cliffs of Es Cubells at sunset and sample local cuisine in its restaurants.



THE CHURCHES OF SANT JORDI AND SANT FRANCESC: These two churches located respectively in the village of Sant Jordi and in the Ses Salines Natural Park are unique in that the former is the only church on the island crowned with battlements and the latter, of great simplicity, has no portico. The adjacent former rectory houses the Ses Salines Interpretation Centre.




THE PHOENICIAN SETTLEMENT OF SA CALETA: Located a stone's throw from the beach of Es Bol Nou, this site is one of the four places on Ibiza that have been declared a World Heritage Site by UNESCO. Its origins as a settlement date back to the 8th century BCE, and remains of the urban layout and two ovens can be seen here.



SES PAÏSSES DE CALA D'HORT: A visit to this site overlooking the islet of Es Vedrà allows you to learn a little more about the Punic and Roman occupation of the island thanks to the remains of two necropolises and an ancient Roman villa that had an oil mill, a wine cellar and several warehouses. Next to the site is Can Sorà, a traditional farmhouse that houses one of the headquarters of the Ibiza Ethnographic Museum.

WHAT TO DO IN SANT JOSEP

- Visit the Ses Salines Interpretation Centre next to the church of Sant Francesc. The Centre displays information on the ecological importance of the salt ponds, the dune chains, the Posidonia oceanica meadows and the cliffs of the natural park, as well as on the numerous marine and land species that live in these habitats, such as the Pityusic lizard (*Podarcis pityusensis*), the seahorse (*Hippocampus ramulosus*), the peregrine falcon (*Falco peregrinus*), the flamingo (*Phoenicopterus ruber*), the Balearic shearwater (*Puffinus mauretanicus*) or the black-winged stilt (*Himantopus himantopus*).
- Stroll along the coast in search of the watchtowers of the south and west of Ibiza: Es Carregador or Sa Sal Rossa, Ses Portes, Es Savinar and En Rovira.
- Watch the Ibiza sunset from one of the many bars and cafés located in the bay of Portmany or from the shores of Cala Tarida, Port des Torrent or Platges de Comte.
- Enjoy numerous water activities in the bay of Portmany, around which the resorts of Cala de Bou and Platja Pinet are located.
- Take a boat trip to discover the ecological and scenic values of the Nature Reserves of Es Vedrà, Es Vedranell and the western islets.
- Go to Sant Josep market on Saturday to buy local agricultural products (open during the summer season) or soak up the colourful atmosphere of the Sant Jordi second-hand market (open all year round).

- Climb Sa Talaia, Ibiza's highest mountain at 475 metres. This is one of the most attractive excursions in the municipality for hikers and cyclists, as from the top you can enjoy a fabulous panoramic view of a large area of the island.

THE BEACHES OF SANT JOSEP

The municipality has more than 20 beaches and coves to suit all tastes and requirements, including **Platja d'en Bossa**, the longest sandy beach in Ibiza and one of the liveliest thanks to the wide range of leisure activities offered by its hotels, restaurants, clubs, pubs and water and nautical activity companies. The wild beaches of **Ses Salines**, **Cala Jondal**, **Cala Bassa**, the group of small coves that make up **Platges de Comte** and **Cala d'Hort**, the best viewpoint over the famous islet of Es Vedrà, stand out for their beauty and popularity. Other unique beaches are **Es Cavallet** - traditionally nudist -, **Cala Codolar**, **Es Bol Nou**, **Cala Carbó**, **Cala Molí** or the beaches of **Cala Vedella**, **Cala Tarida** and **Port des Torrent**, with a family atmosphere.

Natural attractions

SANT ANTONI, MORE THAN JUST UNFORGETTABLE SUNSETS

The beauty of its bay, the spectacular sunsets with the western islets in the background and a virtually unchanged rural landscape are three of the great attractions of Sant Antoni, a place open to all travellers that never fails to surprise, either by the sea or inland.

Open to tourism since the 1930s, what was the island's first resort has become internationally famous for its beautiful sunsets and terraces where you can watch the sun go down to the rhythm of the Balearic beat sound, the musical genre that originated in Ibiza in the 1980s. But beyond this recreational image, Sant Antoni stands out for being the municipality on the island with the second largest protected area and for having one of the best-preserved traditional rural landscapes on Ibiza; an ethnographic heritage of great value that can be seen in its almond tree fields and in the ancient farmhouses built along the secondary roads that lead to Santa Agnès, Sant Mateu, Buscastell and the north of the island. And of course, Sant Antoni offers a wide range of entertainment for the most fun-seeking travellers.

WHAT TO SEE IN SANT ANTONI



SANT ANTONI BAY: Called Portus Magnus by the Romans, this wide bay opening to the west is one of the main attractions of the municipality and the island during the summer season. It is surrounded by a wide range of hotels, restaurants, cafés and shops, as well as the marina and companies specialising in nautical and water activities. The promenade runs along the bay for 3 kilometres, linking the coves of Es Puetó and Caló des Moro. From the fishing dock, located in front of the Ses Fonts promenade, several passenger boats depart for Cala Gració and Cala Salada, as well as for the beaches on the southern side of the bay and three other neighbouring coves in the municipality of Sant Josep: Platges de Comte, Cala Bassa and Port des Torrent.



SUNSET AT SES VARIADES: The stretch of the promenade between Caló des Moro and the breakwater is known as Ses Variades and during the summer it becomes one of the most popular spots on the island thanks to the bars and cafés that play music at sunset, often hosted by famous DJs. Outside the summer season, the promenade allows you to enjoy the beautiful sunsets in a peaceful atmosphere.



TRAIL OF THE CHURCHES: The church of Sant Antoni, whose origins date back to the 14th century, is an excellent example of a Pityusic church-fortress that still has its defensive tower and is the starting point for this trail. Inland, the silhouettes of the small church of Santa Agnès, whose portico is located next to the old main entrance, and the church of Sant Mateu, crowned by a simple belfry, lend a unique beauty to the rural landscape of the two valleys. Meanwhile, a visit to the church of Sant Rafel, built in the late 18th century, reveals an excellent panoramic view of the city of Ibiza and a curvilinear bell tower that lends gracefulness to the austere façade.



SANTA AGNÈS AND THE ALMOND TREES: This small parish is located in the Pla de Corona valley, one of the most peaceful parts of Ibiza. The best time to visit it is between January and February, when its hundreds of almond trees are in bloom.




THE VINEYARDS OF SANT MATEU: The north of the municipality is traditionally linked to wine production and is currently home to the facilities of two of the island's wineries that produce wines with P.G.I. *Ibiza: Vino de la Tierra | Vi de la Terra.*



SANT RAFEL AND POTTERY: Located 8 kilometres away from Sant Antoni, this town has been declared an Area of Craft Interest due to its pottery tradition, and its workshops-shops are open to visitors all year round.

CAP BLANC AQUARIUM: A former lobster nursery, in its fish tanks and pools, this natural cave exhibits a sample of the main marine species that inhabit Ibiza waters. The aquarium facilities are used by the Centre for the Recovery of Marine Species (CREM), so it is sometimes possible to see rescued animals, such as sea turtles, being treated. It is located near Cala Gració.



SES FONTANELLES CAVE: This rocky shelter is home to the only cave paintings on Ibiza, a monochrome black ensemble possibly dating from the Punic period. Also known as Sa Cova des Vi, it is located in a cliffy area with difficult access.

WHAT TO DO IN SANT ANTONI

- Enjoy numerous water and nautical sports thanks to the wide range of activities on offer in the bay: scuba diving, sailing, kitesurfing, paddle-surfing, water-skiing, parasailing, jet-skiing, kayaking, fishing, etc.
- Take a boat trip to admire the beauty of the cliffs of Ses Balandres and Cala d'Albarca, and the Nature Reserves of Es Vedrà, Es Vedranell and the western islets.
- Walk along the coastal trail that links Sant Antoni with Cala Salada, cycle through the area known as Es Broll, stroll along the Pla de Corona as far as the cliffs with views of the Ses Margalides islets, etc.


- Buy local products at the Forada Market (Saturday), the Sant Antoni Farmers' Market (Friday) and the Sant Rafel Craft Market (Thursday, from July to September).

- Visit a wine cellar and taste the island's wines.

THE BEACHES OF SANT ANTONI

The municipality is home to coves and beaches ideal for children's bathing, which stand out for the beauty of their surroundings and their panoramic views. Within the town of Sant Antoni itself are the beaches of **Es Puetó**, **S'Arenal** and **Caló des Moro**, and then there are the beaches of the bay that belong to the administrative area of Sant Josep.

A few minutes away by car or bus you will find **Cala Gració** and **Cala Gracioneta**, two coves surrounded by pine trees separated by a small promontory; the turquoise waters of the photogenic ensemble made up of **Cala Salada** and **Cala Saladeta** - one of the most photographed in Ibiza - and the stone terraces of **Punta Galera**, an old quarry that has become a favourite spot for nudists.

SANT JOAN, THE ESSENCE OF IBIZA

The north of the island has become the favourite refuge for lovers of silence, peace and nature. With almost 60% of its territory protected, Sant Joan is home to unspoilt coves nestled among cliffs, three family-friendly tourist resorts, the most remote parish on Ibiza and amazing hiking and cycling routes.

The most photogenic landscapes of Sant Joan show the traditional and rural Ibiza as it is the municipality with the largest area of agricultural land on the island. With a growing proportion of organic farming, the north of Ibiza captivates travellers with a love of peace and quiet, the good life and nature. The parishes of Sant Joan, Sant Miquel, Sant Vicent and Sant Llorenç make up a fertile territory of fields and stone terraces that have hardly been altered for centuries and preserve an outstanding ethnographic and natural heritage, with Es Amunts standing out as the main jewel of the area. Exploring the forests of this protected area, going in search of the Punic sanctuary where the goddess Tanit was worshipped, visiting the Sunday market of Sant Joan, admiring the traditional rustic houses on the way to Cala de Sant Vicent or Port de Sant Miquel and watching the sunset from the shores of Benirràs are some of the simple pleasures that await you in Ibiza's most peaceful and secluded municipality.

WHAT TO SEE IN SANT JOAN



PUIG DE MISSA DE SANT MIQUEL: This beautiful hilltop architectural complex is crowned by the church of Sant Miquel, whose central body was built at the end of the 16th century in line with the defensive standards of the time. It is worth taking a look at its bell tower and the restored frescoes that adorn its two chapels, as well as attending the *ball pagès* performance that is held weekly in its courtyard during the summer season.



SANT JOAN AND ITS CHURCH: The village after which the municipality is named is a quiet and charming little place whose few houses are spread out along the road and around the church of Sant Joan Baptista. The church, completed in 1770, is built around a single rectangular nave with a vaulted ceiling and seven side chapels. Other distinctive features of the church are its bell tower, erected in the 19th century, and its double-arched portico. On Sundays, the square in front of the church becomes a meeting point for visitors who come to the craft and food market.



SANT VICENT AND ITS COVE: The parish of Sant Vicent remained isolated by the Sa Mala Costa mountain range until the 1960s, when the road linking this area to Sant Joan was built. Stone terraces, centuries-old cottages and a tortuous street layout lead to its simple church, whose square is a true oasis of peace. Inaugurated in 1838, its front façade features a unique arrangement of small windows, the main door and the porch, which is located on the left-hand side. Three kilometres away is the quiet tourist resort of Cala de Sant Vicent, a pleasant beach with views of the island of Tagomago and a wide range of services.



SANT LLORENÇ AND THE VILLAGE OF BALÀFIA: Its simple church with a single-arched portico was completed in 1797 and has a single nave with seven side chapels. One kilometre from the church is the Balàfia settlement, a group of five houses and two defence towers that is considered one of the best examples of traditional architecture on Ibiza.



PUNIC SANCTUARY OF ES CULLERAM: A path that starts near Cala de Sant Vicent leads to this fenced-in grotto surrounded by pine trees that was a Punic sanctuary from the 5th century BCE onwards. Excavations carried out after the discovery of the site in 1907 brought to light hundreds of terracotta statuettes and busts representing the goddess Tanit.

COVA DE CAN MARÇÀ: For more than 100,000 years, water has modelled chambers, vestibules and curious stalagmite and stalactite formations in the interior of this cave of karstic origin located next to Port de Sant Miquel. Buddha's Temple, the Cascade Room and the Lake of Wishes are some of the sites to be discovered on a guided tour.



PORTINATX: This is one of the main tourist centres of Sant Joan thanks to its wide range of services (hotels, restaurants, shops, bars, etc.) arranged around the beaches of S'Arenal Gran, S'Arenal Petit and Port de Portinatx. Like Port de Sant Miquel and Cala de Sant Vicent, it is an ideal place for families.

WHAT TO DO IN SANT JOAN

- Admire the beauty of the cliffs in the north of Ibiza on board the pleasure boats that leave from Portinatx.
- Explore the surroundings of the beaches of Portinatx, Port de Sant Miquel and Cala de Sant Vicent on a stand-up paddle board or aboard a pedalo.
- Follow the trail that leads to Punta des Moscarter and the lighthouse of the same name, the highest in the Balearic Islands; or walk down to the remote, unspoilt cove of Es Portitxol, on the coast of Sant Miquel.
- Admire the fabulous views from the top of Torre des Molar, located a few kilometres from Port de Sant Miquel and reached via a pleasant hiking trail.
- Visit the Es Amunts Interpretation Centre in Sant Llorenç to learn about the natural and ethnographic values for which part of the mountainous coastal strip that extends through the municipalities of Sant Joan and Sant Antoni was declared a Special Protection Area.

■ Buy handicrafts and agricultural products from the north of Ibiza at the Sunday market in Sant Joan.

■ Hop on the tourist train that leaves from Portinatx and discover some of the most beautiful spots in the north of the island.

THE BEACHES OF SANT JOAN

The rugged northern coast is home to coves for all tastes, from ones with all the facilities to others hidden away under cliffs, ideal for those who wish to get away from the hustle and bustle or practice nudism. The beaches of **Port de Sant Miquel**, **Cala de Sant Vicent**, **S'Arenal Gran**, **S'Arenal Petit** and **Port de Portinatx** have accommodation, restaurants, shops and water sports companies, making them a good choice for families. **Benirràs** is also very popular, thanks to its hippy atmosphere, its sunsets and the unique landscape provided by the boathouses and the islet of Cap Bernat.

The rest of the coves in Sant Joan are perfect for those who do not need services or just need to have a beach bar at hand or to rent sun loungers and parasols: **Cala de Xarraca**, **Cala des Xuclar**, **Cala d'en Serra**, **S'Illot des Renclí**, **Es Pas de s'Illa** and **Caló des Moltons**.


